Before starting a new painting project, the first step is to properly prepare the canvas. Instructor Katerina Lanfranco, who teaches painting at Hunter College in New York, uploaded two free videos to her YouTube channel (including Canvas Stretching and Canvas Priming) to successfully lay the foundation for your image. Both tutorials are really about best practices to get an effective canvas. Lanfranco will guide you through the materials you need to set up, including a ruler, scissors and stretchers or strainer straps, and will clearly guide you through the process of properly cutting the canvas and attaching it to the rods. Priming comes further: with the help of gesso will create a flexible surface that receives paint well and allows for more efficient spread. Lanfranco presents materials for this process, including gesso, gesso brush, and sandpaper (for grinding surfaces on each coat so that the canvas is smooth and ready to paint) — and guides you through step by step with easy-to-follow instructions. At the end of the course you will have a canvas ready for painting. Want to try or work on improving your acrylic painting skills? On his YouTube channel, artist Will Kemp writes and creates his own videos about classic painting techniques, with a focus on the use of acrylic paint. whether you're just starting out or thinking about a more ambitious project, Villa Villa's films different strategies for the medium. Start with simple basic pads, including proper cleaning of acrylic brush, choice of acrylic substrate and the basics of color mixing. Along with various videos on proper color mixing, Will will also set himself up with a series of painting tutorials ranging from beginner to more advanced skill set. And best of all: It's all free. Watercolors have a reputation for difficult painting discipline. This watercolor course for beginners on Udem will build trust for new painters, giving you the tools to master the basics and leading with a fun approach to the medium. All you need to get started is a box of watercolor paints, one round brush, watercolor paper, black ink or felt pen, pencil, eraser, transparent or white wax candle or crayel, and two water jars. Created by Nicola A. Blakemore, the course (about \$100) includes four hours of video-on-demand and you can even access course materials on your TV or mobile phone. The purpose of the classes is simple — to teach you how watercolor paints work with water and how to use it effectively. Blakemore's class will guide you through understanding the principle of color washing, how the same colors can create shape and shading, how you can create lights and shadows using watercolors, and how to mix paint colors correctly. Founded in 1929, the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) houses some of the most famous contemporary paintings in the world. While guests lined up to see Vincent Van Gogh's Starry Night or masterworks from Jackson Pollock and Willem de Kooning, the museum now has an online program that can be accessed at home. Although MoMA offers many free online courses exploring various artistic disciplines, The Studio: Postwar Abstract Painting focuses on the materials, techniques and conceptual processes of seven New York School artists: de Kooning, Pollock, Yayoi Kusama, Agnes Martin, Barnett Newman, Ad Reinhardt and Mark Rothko. The cost-free course is set up so you can work at your own pace and schedule. Your instructor will guide you through the shows in the studio and gallery tutorials, and assign readings to give context to the larger cultural, intellectual and historical events that shaped these artists after World War II. The class also includes a number of optional studio exercises for which you will need artistic materials. While there is a huge amount of scholarship available on the color theory itself (see Josef Albers' basic color interaction), getting hands-on with the paints in the studio at home will also open your eyes as it works on canvas. Jeanette Jobson's free Color Theory & Mixing - The Basics video is a great introduction to mixing, using a split basic palette. This palette uses two shades of each base color (red, yellow, and blue) — with one warm and one cool shade. Jobson clearly explains many terms related to color and mixing, including color deviation. She guides you through what exactly that means and how each shade of paint illustrates it, with an assortment of shades in her palette. Jobson then begins his demonstration of mixing: a course of disaster in the nuance of a process that will surely set you to success. Gouache is a water-based carrier with a heavier pigment load than watercolor, and is therefore designed to be more opaque. In this video, artist Minnie Small breaks down the bases of gouache. This tutorial explores not only what it is and how to use it, but also which brushes and paper are best suited for the medium. If you have experience with watercolors, gouache can be another style of painting from which you want to play. As Small explains in the free video, many of the watercolor tools you use, such as a type of brush, will also work on gouache. Minnie illustrates the different opacity of the paint, as well as its variety of beneficial properties, including its velvety matte finish, fast drying time and the fact that it can be reactivated with water after drying. So, if you want to continue working part of the finished image, you can easily redo it. When choosing the best online painting classes, a few have come into play.
